Progress 8

The Department for Education (DfE) has changed how school performance is measured.


From 2016, all secondary schools will be measured on progress, using the progress 8 measure. This will be published in the secondary school performance tables.

What does progress 8 measure?

Progress 8 calculates how much progress students make between their results in year 6 and their results in year 11. It is a 'value-added' measure, meaning students' results are compared to the achievements of other students with similar year 6 results.

Progress 8 will only be calculated for individual students in order to calculate a school's score.

A school's progress 8 score is an average of all students' individual scores. It shows whether, as a group, students in the school made above or below average progress compared to similar students in other schools.

Which subjects are included?

Progress 8 is designed to offer a broad and balanced curriculum, with a focus on academic subjects. Students will have their achievement measured across eight subjects. These will include:

- Maths and English
- Three English baccalaureate (EBacc) qualifications
- Three other approved qualifications

The image at the bottom of this page shows the different groups of subjects that count towards the progress 8 measure.

If a student sits more than eight subjects the highest results for the qualifications in each group will be used.

If a student has not taken eight qualifications they will get a lower progress 8 score.

There is no compulsory combination of EBacc qualifications that students have to sit.

FAQs

Will I find out my child's progress 8 score?

Schools are not required to share students' progress 8 scores. A school may choose to report it.

Can my child take more than three EBacc subjects?

Yes. Students can take any subjects in the 'open group' that are in the DfE's list of approved qualifications.

Do all students have to study a progress 8 choice of subjects?

All students except those who did not complete tests at the end of year 6, will have a progress 8 score calculated. However, a school can enter any student for any qualification.

How do science subjects count in progress 8?

Biology, chemistry, physics and computer science each count as one qualification. Core and additional science also count as one qualification, but double science will count as two qualifications. All sciences can be included in the EBacc qualifications and in the final three spaces of the 'open group'.
